Thank you to those of you who attended our school Mass today at Good Shepherd Church, it was the prefect way to celebrate the feast of the Baptism of Jesus and to welcome the new term. Thank you to Mrs Saunders for leading the choir.

Congratulations to all the pupils in year 4 who had the task of making a Viking ship over the holidays. An excellent effort from all taking part and I know Miss Corrigan is delighted with their work. On the subject of homework, I will be setting the first whole school homework task for this year linking current affairs and literacy. It relates to the government's latest announcement regarding increased funding to support literacy and the importance of reading. Children will bring home a letter today with details. Please do ask your child's teacher if you do not receive the letter.

Next week will see the launch of our 'Whole school maths challenge' Children will be set a maths task to complete at home. It will centre around reasoning skills and using and applying basic knowledge to solve problems. There will be different tasks for early years, key stage 1 and 2. The children are excited about taking on the challenges and I hope you will support them at home. There will be a big focus on 'Talk for learning' and you will be given ideas on how to work with your child. We will be running another maths curriculum evening in February - information to follow.

Further improving mathematical reasoning skills is a big part of our school development plan this year and recent assessments indicate that the children are making good progress in this area.



Features of Persuasive Writing

Purpose:

To argue the case for a point of view and convince the reader.



Structure:

Introduction – What is the writing about and what is your opinion.

Arguments to support your opinion

Conclusion - repeat your point of view

Language Features:

Usually written in present tense.

Includes logical connectives to link ideas (therefore, however)

Use emotive language (powerful verbs and strong adjectives)

Ask rhetorical questions

Dare the reader to disagree

Counter arguments from the other point of view.

Try and use some facts as well as opinions.
