Fr Con's Reflection

This Sunday's Gospel passage at Mass is Jesus healing of the 12 year old daughter of Jairus, a synagogue official. The girl is very close to death.

Jesus accompanies the man straightaway. On the way, a woman suffering with a serious blood complaint for 12 years touches the hem of Jesus' garment, hoping for a cure. She succeeds and is cured instantly. What is so interesting here is that Jesus felt power go out from him. Therefore he is insistent – he has to know who touched him. The woman duly owns up, and is commended by Jesus for her faith – she goes home healed. (Jesus arrives at Jairus' house and raises the young girl from the dead – the onlookers having mocked him when he said she was only asleep).

The encounter with the older woman on the way emphasizes that it is God the Father giving Jesus the power to work miracles. He felt power go out from him, as she touched his garments. Therefore he must identify the person responsible. May the restrictions of the pandemic lead to a deepening of faith in all of us.
